


Greetings!

Beyond Swastika and Jim Crow Teachers Workshop

Along with our events this semester the Center also partnered with Miami-Dade Public Schools to deliver a daylong workshop on the "Beyond Swastika and Jim Crow" exhibit. This workshop, which was lead by Dr. Asher Milbuaer and Dr. Michael Gillespie introduced the ideas of the exhibit and analyzed how to involve these concepts in the teacher's curriculums.

The workshop began with an introduction to the universities archival services. They explained how these services can be used by the teachers in their classes. This was followed by a brief presentation by Dr. Donald Cunnigen in regards to the "Beyond Swastika and Jim Crow" exhibit and then a guided tour led by Dr. Cunnigen. The workshop then had a screening of the accompanying documentary to the exhibit "From Swastika to Jim Crow."



The workshop concluded with Dr. Gillespie and Dr. Milbuaer discussing with the teachers their feelings about the exhibit, what it meant to them, and how it could be a teachable moment for their students. This coming semester, the Center has an exciting series of events scheduled. Our season begins on February 16th with the Amazonia Vocal Ensemble, a group dedicated to the performance and preservation of Latin American choral music, which will present a lecture and demonstration at Florida International University of Latin Music popular in the South Florida community. The event is free and open to the public.

This will be followed by presentations from February 23-28 by this year's writer in residence, Norman Manea. Mr. Manea is a Jewish Romanian writer and author of short fiction, novels, and essays about the Holocaust, daily life in a communist state, and exile.
